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5. Type of Incident: On or about April 15 severe storms, flooding and tornadoes resulted in seven (7) confirmed deaths and 18 reported injuries. Tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, hail and straight line winds began moving across the northern portion of Alabama in the early morning hours of April 27, 2011. A second wave involved numerous super-cell thunderstorms and produced long lived, strong to violent tornadoes across the northern two-thirds of central Alabama. The National Weather Service (NWS) meteorologist began assessment of storm damage from a tragically historic day of tornadic activity and severe weather. The NWS reported tornadoes ranging from EF1 to EF5. Multiple injuries and fatalities were reported.

Current Situation:

Effective June 21, 2011, State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) returned to Activation Level 3 with the return of Operation Section to SEOC from the JFO.

A total of \$57,241,099 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$56,509,453 has been dispersed. Six hundred forty-eight (648) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$19,570,942.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount – 1,141, Calhoun – 1,465, Cullman – 5,623, DeKalb – 2,699, Jackson – 2,366, Jefferson – 12,908, Lawrence – 2,098, Limestone – 2,545, Madison – 16,892, Marshall – 4,621, Morgan – 2,310, St. Clair – 1,827, Tuscaloosa – 12,407, and Walker – 2,176.

Registration for funeral assistance is 338 as of COB June 21, 2011, and 137 requests have been approved for a total of \$933,082.

As of June 21, 2011, 15 Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 30,111 visitors.

A total of 7,824 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 369 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) have been submitted to the State, 369 RPAs have been logged into data entry and 369 have been entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). One hundred thirteen (113) Project Worksheets (PWs) have been received and entered into EMMIE and thirty-nine (39) have been obligated for \$5,661,301. Two hundred seventy-six (276) Kick-off Meetings have been completed.

There are 20 inspectors in the field. As of June 21, 2011, 45,809 inspections have been issued with 45,557 returned for 99.4 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 107 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field, seventeen (17) are bi-lingual (including Spanish, Creole, French, Vietnamese, Laotian and Sign language).

Fifty-eight (58) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) have been

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approved for United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. An estimated 3.6 million Cubic Yards (CYs) of debris to be removed by USACE Mission Assignment (MA); a total of 3,189,569 CYs has been removed.

Hours of Operation for the Joint Field office (JFO) are 0730 CDT to 1800 CDT Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday.

Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Medical Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building, and the Cullman County Courthouse.

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Division Supervisors, Task Force Leaders (TFLDs), and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions coordinated with key state, county, and local officials and held several meetings to address recovery activities currently underway, planned, and requested. Staff facilitated the resolution of issues and concerns between officials and FEMA Program staff. Principal issues addressed involved public assistance (PA), temporary housing (TH), and debris clearance (particularly private property debris removal and associated deadlines to maximize financial assistance, long-term community recovery (LTCR), mitigation, and Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) closures

17b. Operations – Hazard Mitigation (HM):

The Joint FEMA and Alabama Mitigation Branch Implementation Plan was approved on June 20, 2011.

AL Hazard Mitigation Grant program (HMGP):

Letters of Intent (LOI) – 187 received for an estimated total of \$167,113,899. Three (3) HMGP applications have been received.

Community Education Outreach (CEO):

Mitigation advisors have counseled a total of 5,949 survivors at DRCs.

Outreach staffed five (5) building supply stores in Jefferson, Madison, Shelby and Walker counties and three (3) local building supply stores in Blount, Etowah and Talladega Counties. Outreach staff have staffed a total of 18 building supply stores in Calhoun, DeKalb, Jefferson, Madison, Marshall, Shelby, Tuscaloosa and Walker counties: two (2) big box stores in Tuscaloosa County, one (1) hardware store in Jefferson County and five (5) local building supply stores in Blount, Calhoun, Etowah and Jefferson and Talladega counties for a total of 26 outreach stores.

CEO staff has conducted outreach at 31 special events in Calhoun, Colbert, DeKalb, Jackson, Jefferson, Lauderdale, Limestone, Macon, Madison, Marion, Montgomery and Tuscaloosa counties.

CEO writers conducted seven (7) interviews and drafted 17 success stories, two (2) have been approved.

Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA):

HPA staff has attended 40 Kick-off Meetings in support of PA with 57 potential applicants.

Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA):

HMA staff attended 24 Kick-off Meetings with 244 potential applicants present.

HMA staff and State Technical Assistance teams made technical assistance visits to DeKalb, Franklin, and Walker County Emergency Management Agencies to discuss individual and community safe room project and application development issues. HMA staff have attended a total of four (4) technical assistance visits to DeKalb, Franklin, Jefferson and Walker counties.

Floodplain Management and Insurance Group (FMI):

During this operational period FMI has completed nine (9) flood reviews for PA, EHP and temporary housing. FMI staff have completed a total of 135 flood reviews.

FMI staff have met a total of 262 floodplain managers or public officials out of 277 (95 percent) in National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities in impacted counties. All impacted counties have been visited with the exception of Lauderdale County.

ONA funeral staff completed a special project to identify family or friend for each of the fatalities listed on the American Red Cross (ARC) Fatality Report to coordinate funeral information and process the funeral cases to ensure all cases were handled to completion.

Crisis Counseling-Immediate Services Program (CC-ISP):

HS Group Supervisor and two (2) Crisis Counseling staff attended three (3) meetings sponsored by Project Hope for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired in Huntsville (Madison/Limestone Counties) on June 19, 2011, Gardendale (Jefferson County) on June 20 and Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County) on June 21. The FEMA Crisis Counseling staff answered questions from survivors about FEMA assistance. The Disabilities Coordinator, Voluntary Agency Liaison (VAL) representative, Community Relations (CR), State Mental Health, and Services for the Deaf were in attendance.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA):

A total of 1,058 applications have been received, 182 have been approved and 369 disapproved. The total amount disbursed is \$67,065. There are 507 applications currently in review for DUA claims.

Disaster Housing Operations (DHOPS):

JFO DHOPS and Pre-Placement Interview Approval Processing (PPI) staff are assisting with efforts to reach out to over 300 applicants that the National Processing Service Center (NPSC) have been unable to contact. Staff continued to make follow-up calls to applicants given rental resources to determine if they have found adequate housing.

Volunteer Agencies:

Staff supported the State Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) Chair in establishing Long Term Recovery Committees (LTRC) in various Alabama Counties. Responded to additional counties' requests for LTRC support. Provide training, technical assistance and support to existing LTRCs. Initiated discussions towards formation of new LTRC in some Counties (Long Term Recovery Coordinator meetings to provide LTRC model and structure).

June 18, 2011:

Val traveled to Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County) to attend a Hispanic radio program requested by the External Affairs Division. VAL provided all pertinent FEMA program information and materials to all volunteer organization and information was made available to the Hispanic community.

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VAL met with Church of Christ Disaster Response Organization (CCDRO) in Florence (Lauderdale County) seeking information on the rebuilding process for the damaged properties; staff invited CCDRO Organization to participate with the NW Alabama LTRC. CCDRO was advised of the importance of completed Needs Assessment survey and Written Consents from owners in order to avoid duplication of benefits. VAL met with NW Alabama LTRC regarding available options for reaching damaged addresses. Staff visited the Decatur United Methodist Warehouse (Limestone County) regarding pertinent children items and coordinated with the Limestone County LTRC for the completion of 100 Children Recovery Kits to be used for a children's' camp day being organized by the LTRC. Coordination was performed and kits are being prepared.

Val sent all useful LTRC information to the Public Relation person within the NW Alabama LTR regarding LTRC purpose in the Franklin, Marion, Lauderdale and Colbert counties. Public Relation liaison will appoint with local Newspapers and media to achieve this task.

Staff attended Mayors' daily debriefing at Tuscaloosa City Hall (Tuscaloosa County).
