8. Current Situation:

A total of 260 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) has been logged into data entry and 190 have been entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). Nine (9) Project Worksheets (PWs) have been received and entered into EMMIE and seven (7) have been obligated for \$812,067. One hundred and forty (140) Kick-off Meetings have been completed, and 24 Applicant Briefings completed.

As of COB May 26, 2011, 28 Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 21,548 visitors.

As of COB May 26, 2011, one (1) general purpose shelter remains open with 53 occupants.

A total of 6,297 rental units have been identified as available.

Fifty-five (55) jurisdictions and one (1) lake, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County), are requesting United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. Of an estimated 3.5 million Cubic Yards (CYs) of debris to be removed by the USACE Mission Assignment (MA), a total of 1,321,077 CYs have been removed to date.

A total of \$44,071,312 has been approved for the Individuals and Households Program (IHP), and \$43,683,782 has been dispersed. Four hundred and twenty six (426) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$12,865,200.

Registration for funeral assistance is 314 as of COB May 26, 2011, and 39 requests have been approved for a total of \$233,859.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount – 1,056, Calhoun – 1,334, Cullman – 5,399, DeKalb – 2,578, Jackson – 2,247, Jefferson – 12,004, Lawrence – 2,006, Limestone – 2,321, Madison – 16,220, Marshall – 4,450, Morgan – 2,200, St. Clair – 1,711, Tuscaloosa – 11,723, and Walker – 2,038.

There are 46 Inspectors in the field. As of COB May 26, 2011, 41,311 inspections have been issued with 40,539 returned for 98 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 208 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field. Twenty-eight (28) are bi-lingual.

Hours of Operation for the Joint Field office (JFO) are 0700 CDT to 1900 CDT Sunday through Saturday.

12. Significant Impacting Weather in the past O-Period: Numerous severe weather advisories. Confirmed EF-1 tornado in Lauderdale County.

15. Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin Counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Management Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building and the Cullman County Courthouse.

Multiple State Correctional Facilities received damage.

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Task Force Leaders (TFLDs) and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions met with key state, county, and local officials to assist in meeting needs regarding temporary housing, debris clearance and Clean Sweep activities, long-term community recovery, mitigation, and shelters.

17a. Operations – Public Assistance (PA): The Mission Assignment (MA) through the USACE to provide temporary critical public facilities in heavily impacted areas is ongoing. USACE has been approved to provide private property debris removal in 16 jurisdictions. USACE has been approved to proceed with construction of the Shoal Creek Volunteer Fire Station #2 and five (5) temporary fire stations. USACE began construction at the Johnson’s Crossing Volunteer Fire Department in Cullman County. Perry and Greene Counties requested PDAs.

Twenty-four (24) Applicant Briefings and 140 Kick-off Meetings have been completed to date.

17b. Operations – Hazard Mitigation (HM):

Mitigation Branch: The Mitigation Branch and Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA) staff held a teleconference with University of Alabama engineers to develop the specifications for demonstration of a shelter the University is constructing for the Safer Alabama Summit.

Community Education Outreach (CEO): Mitigation advisors counseled 141 disaster survivors at 28 DRCs for a total of 3,731 disaster survivors counseled.

Outreach staff is present in six (6) outreach locations: 4 national home improvement stores (Calhoun, DeKalb, and Tuscaloosa Counties), 1 big box store (Tuscaloosa County), and 1 hardware store (Jefferson County).

Number residents approached at outreach events: 1,103 for a total of 5,676

Number residents counseled at outreach events: 414 for a total of 2,041 residents

Number residents referred to DRCs from outreach events: 153 for a total of 793

Number of publications distributed at outreach events: 605 for a total of 3,144

Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA): HPA staff attended five (5) Kick-off meetings in support of PA. The meetings were held in Bibb, Madison, Marion, and Jefferson Counties and attended by 75 potential applicants. HPA staff attended 15 Kick-off meetings with 160 potential applicants.

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Staff attended two (2) Applicant Briefings in Bibb and Lamar Counties. The briefings were attended by 22 potential applicants. HPA staff attended 9 Applicant Briefings with 315 potential applicants in attendance.

Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA): HMA staff attended four (4) Kick-off Meetings in support of PA. The meetings were held in Franklin, Jefferson and Madison Counties and attended by 66 potential applicants. HMA staff has attended 16 Kick-off Meetings with 159 potential applicants in attendance.

Floodplain Management and Insurance Group (FMI): FMI staff have met with a total of 70 floodplain managers or public officials in the following counties: Cullman, DeKalb, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Limestone, Marshall, Morgan, Walker and Tuscaloosa Counties.

Community debris removal continued in Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County), Hackleburg (Marion County), Cullman, Fairview and Holly Pond (Cullman County), Ragland and Moody (St. Clair County), Cordova and Sipsey (Walker County), Guntersville (Marshall County), and Garden City (Cullman/Blount County). County debris removal continued in Blount, Tuscaloosa, Cullman, Elmore, Jackson, Limestone, Marion, Madison, DeKalb, St. Clair, Cherokee, Tallapoosa, and Walker Counties.

Temporary Housing Units (THUs) were delivered in the following counties: one (1) Blount and one (1) in Choctaw.

THUs were installed in the following counties: one (1) Autauga, one (1) Calhoun, one (1) Cullman, one (1) Etowah, four (4) Franklin, one (1) Lawrence, one (1) Marion, one (1) Marshall, and one (1) Tuscaloosa.

Applicant Services: Staff received one (1) Congressional inquiry from DeKalb County.

Human Services Group Supervisor (HSGS): Staff attended a meeting of the Northern District of Alabama Law Enforcement Coordination Center (LECC) Advisory Board and conducted a brief presentation of FEMA programs and answered questions. Approximately 20 attendees from Federal, State, and local law enforcement, representing Federal Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice, Drug Enforcement Administration, United States Attorney's Office, Birmingham Police and other law enforcement agencies.

Crisis Counseling-Immediate Services Program (CC-ISP): The CC-ISP grant approval letter for funding was signed by the Federal Coordinating Officer (FCO) and Disaster Recovery Manager (DRM). The letter and request for final revisions and conditions were sent to the State, and the obligation funds and transfer was processed to the State.

Other Needs Assistance (ONA): Staff have received 270 registrations for funeral assistance of which 19 percent eligible and have been paid. Sixty-four (64) cases are awaiting additional document from the applicants to complete processing of funeral assistance.

Special Needs: One (1) special needs referral was received on May 26, 2011. The total number of special needs referrals to date is 96 with 92 completed and 4 pending.

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Disaster Housing Operations (DHOPS): Total THUs on private sites are 114 and total THUs on commercial pads are 15.

Pre-Placement Interview (PPI) Approval Processing: Applicants approved for PPI to date are 206.

2. Disaster Housing - Devise and execute housing strategy to meet the needs of disaster survivors.

3. Debris Removal and Repair/Restoration – Provide comprehensive reimbursement, restoration services, debris removal support and

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temporary roofing assistance to all registered survivors to enable restoration of damaged homes to a habitable status.

4. Security – Provide security capability to protect heavily damaged neighborhoods that support survivor’s willingness to move to more resilient living facilities.

5. Damage Assessment –Provide geographical coordinates for all major areas of damage and coordinate National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA) assessment of those areas not yet assessed.
