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5. Type of Incident: On or about April 15 severe storms, flooding and tornadoes resulted in seven (7) confirmed deaths and 18 reported injuries. Tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, hail and straight line winds began moving across the northern portion of Alabama in the early morning hours of April 27, 2011. A second wave involved numerous super-cell thunderstorms and produced long lived, strong to violent tornadoes across the northern two-thirds of central Alabama. The National Weather Service (NWS) meteorologist began assessment of storm damage from a tragically historic day of tornadic activity and severe weather. The NWS reported tornadoes ranging from EF1 to EF5. Multiple injuries and fatalities were reported.

8. Current Situation:

A total of 305 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) has been logged into data entry and 268 have been entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). Eighteen (18) Project Worksheets (PWs) have been received and entered into EMMIE and eleven (11) have been obligated for \$2,568,073. One hundred and seventy-three (173) Kick-off Meetings have been completed, and twenty-four (24) Applicant Briefings completed.

As of COB May 31, 2011, 27 Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 23,320 visitors.

As of COB May 31, 2011, one (1) general purpose shelter remains open with 59 occupants.

A total of 6,805 rental units have been identified as available.

Fifty-five (55) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County), are requesting United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. Of an estimated 3.5 million Cubic Yards (CYs) of debris to be removed by the USACE Mission Assignment (MA), a total of 1,883,484 CYs have been removed to date.

A total of \$46,327,418 has been approved for the Individuals and Households Program (IHP), and \$45,821,278 has been dispersed. Four hundred and sixty-three (463) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$13,982,600.

Registration for funeral assistance is 317 as of COB May 31, 2011, and 55 requests have been approved for a total of \$320,184.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount – 1,080, Calhoun – 1,366, Cullman – 5,465, DeKalb – 2,603, Jackson – 2,277, Jefferson – 12,246, Lawrence – 2,036, Limestone – 2,417, Madison – 16,414, Marshall – 4,489, Morgan – 2,240, St. Clair – 1,751, Tuscaloosa – 11,910, and Walker – 2,065.

There are 38 Inspectors in the field. As of COB May 31, 2011, 42,368 inspections have been issued with 41,902 returned for 99 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 220 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field. Twenty-eight (28) are bi-lingual.

The Continuity of Operations (COOP) Plan was signed on May 31, 2011.

Hours of Operation for the Joint Field office (JFO) effective June 5, 2011, are 0730 CDT to 1800 CDT Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday.

15. Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin Counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Management Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building and the Cullman County Courthouse.

Multiple State Correctional Facilities received damage.

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Task Force Leaders (TFLDs) and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions coordinated with the key state, county, and local officials to determine efficient approach to meeting needs regarding public assistance, temporary housing, debris clearance, long-term community recovery, mitigation, and shelters. FOB supported the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Secretary's visit to Marion County, May 29, 2011.

17a. Operations – Public Assistance (PA): The Mission Assignment (MA) through the USACE to provide temporary critical public facilities in heavily impacted areas is ongoing. USACE has been approved to provide private property debris removal in 18 jurisdictions.

17b. Operations – Hazard Mitigation (HM):

On May 28, 2011, the Mitigation Branch Director and Management Specialist visited the DRCs and building supply store outreach locations in Tuscaloosa County.

Community Education Outreach (CEO):

Outreach staff are present in six (6) building supply store outreach locations in Calhoun, Jefferson, Marshall, and Tuscaloosa Counties, in a big box store in Tuscaloosa County and in a local building supply store in Jefferson County.

To date Outreach staff have staffed eight (8) building supply stores in Calhoun, DeKalb, Jefferson, Marshall, and Tuscaloosa Counties, two (2) big box stores in Tuscaloosa County, one (1) hardware store in Jefferson County and a local building supply Store in Jefferson County.

Outreach staff attended a special event, TBN Network Gospel Concert Benefit for Storm Victims, on May 30, 2011. The event was held at the Bothwell Auditorium in the City of Birmingham (Jefferson County).

Outreach staff have attended three (3) special events in Calhoun, Jefferson and Tuscaloosa Counties.

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Hazard Performance Analysis (HPA):

HPA staff have attended 19 Kick-off Meetings with 259 potential applicants.

FMI staff have met with 95 floodplain managers or public officials of 277 (34 percent) in National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities in Cullman, DeKalb, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Limestone, Marshall, Morgan, Walker and Tuscaloosa Counties.

FMI staff have completed 40 flood reviews for Public Assistance (PA), Environmental and Historic Preservation (EHP) and temporary housing.

18a. ESF-01 State of Alabama – Transportation: The Alabama Forest Recovery Task Force, created by Governor Bentley, consists of 27 personnel to help remove fallen timber from the reforest areas affected by the tornado outbreak.

18b. ESF-02 Communication: All cell phone and internet services are operational.

The total CYs of debris removed during the reporting period ending COB on May 31, 2011, was 218,235 CYs with 1,883,484 CYs removed to date.

Community debris removal continued in Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County), Hackleburg (Marion County), Cullman, Fairview and Holly Pond (Cullman County), Ragland and Moody (St. Clair County), Cordova and Sipsey (Walker County), Guntersville (Marshall County), and Garden City (Cullman/Blount County). County debris removal continued in Blount, Tuscaloosa, Cullman, Elmore, Jackson, Lawrence, Limestone, Marion, Madison, Morgan, DeKalb, St. Clair, Cherokee, Tallapoosa, and Walker Counties.

Temporary Housing Units (THUs) were installed in the following counties: one (1) Autauga, two (2) Blount, one (1) Calhoun, one (1) Choctaw, four (4) Cullman, four (4) DeKalb, two (2) Elmore, two (2) Etowah, four (4) Franklin, three (3) Hale, one (1) Jackson, seven (7) Lawrence, three (3) Limestone, four (4) Madison, four (4) Marion, two (2) Marshall, three (3) St. Clair, one (1) Sumter, five (5) Tuscaloosa and seven (7) Walker.

18f. Individual Assistance (IA):

Applicant Services:

Staff have received a total of 10,580 cases, 8,216 have been reviewed, cases pending 2,364 with 78 percent completed.

Deputy IA Branch Director:

On May 29, three (3) IA subject matter expert (SME) staff and three (3) CR staff supported a Christian television network event with other FEMA representations in Birmingham (Jefferson County). IA staff made contact with 125 persons and four (4) Special Needs families to review with call backs. Staff distributed 85 FEMA packets entitled "Help After a Disaster".

On May 31, one (1) IA Housing SME visited Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County) for a broadcast on a popular AM radio station that crosses

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five (5) stations. A discussion was held with the Tuscaloosa TV news for two (2) broadcasts. Two (2) IA SME staff visited an AM radio studio in Tuscumbia (Colbert County).

A site visit was conducted by the IA Deputy Director and Deputy FCO in Tuscaloosa to meet with the shelter transition team.

Human Services Group Supervisor (HSGS):

HS Group Supervisor conducted a presentation of FEMA programs on May 31 for the Indian River Project Rebound Crisis Counselors in Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County).

Other Needs Assistance (ONA):

IA staff continued to determine eligibility for funeral assistance. Currently, 264 registrations have been received, of which 51 (69 percent) are eligible and have been paid. There are 190 cases pending eligibility determination.

Twenty-two (22) cases authorizing payment of eligible funeral expenses were received from the FCO and sent to (NCT) on May 31, 2011 for payment. These cases represent 24 fatalities.

Twenty (20) new cases representing 33 fatalities have been sent to the FCO for payment authorization.

The total number of cases for funeral assistance is 90, representing 119 fatalities. A balance of 119 fatalities (50 percent) remains from the 238 confirmed by the State.

ONA Performance Review continues.

Special Needs:

Two (2) new special needs referrals were received on May 30 and 31. The total received to date is 104 and all have been completed.

Crisis Counseling-Immediate Services Program (CC-ISP):

The HS Group Supervisor and the two (2) CC Program Specialists participated in the three (3) day training session for the Indian River Project Rebound Crisis Counselors in Tuscaloosa (Tuscaloosa County). There were 12 newly hired counselors and 3 project managers in attendance. This is the second of several training sessions across the State since approval of the Crisis Counseling-Immediate Services grant

Disaster Housing Operations (DHOPS): Total work orders issued- 252, completed work orders - 103, work orders in process - 114, work orders requested - 35. Total rental resources are 7,595 throughout the disaster area.

Disaster Unemployment Agency (DUA):

As of May 27, 2011, there have been 976 applications received, with 108 approved and 91 disapproved. The amount disbursed to date is \$16,969.

Disaster Legal Services (DLS):

Contact was made with the DLS District Representative to coordinate activities of the Young Lawyers participating in the DLS program. There are 15 participating attorneys and 45 calls to the hotline for assistance.

Pre-Placement Interview (PPI) Approval Processing:

Total pads leased - 68, number of applicants assigned to units - 27, units on sites - 50, Ready for Occupancy (RFO) - 36, and 15 licensed.

AL Governor's Faith Based and Community Incentives (GFBCI):

Volunteer Reception Centers (VRCs) are open in Hale, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Tuscaloosa and Walker Counties.

Daily contact continued with all VRCs to determine needs and volunteer information.

Staff worked with All Hands volunteers to gather specific volunteer information and needs, and to produce county level volunteer information. One (1) NCCC team assisted All Hands volunteers.

Staff continued to develop local Long Term Recovery Committees (LTRCs) in the affected counties.

GFBCI is the lead state agency for the FEMA Disaster Case Management Grant. The Grant is in development.

Staff assisted Legislative Affairs to field various offers of support and services.

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Work to locate building supplies and materials for rebuilding on projects continued.

NCCC team continued to operate and manage the Tuscaloosa Volunteer Reception Center and Call Center (VRC) and will be training local volunteers to run the VRC. Work on a succession plan for local community to assume responsibility of this operation by June 3, 2011 continued.

One (1) NCCC Team deployed to Walker County VOAD and one (1) NCCC Team deployed to Phil Campbell to assist Mennonites with building of homes.

Category One – Long Term Recovery Groups

The VAL met with the Red Cross representative for DeKalb and Franklin Counties to discuss strategy for implementing long term recovery.

VAL Catholic Charities and 32 families met at the Holy Cross Catholic Church in Marshall County for information on how to register with FEMA.

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VAL conducted webinar and in-person training in Huntsville (Madison County) for LTRC and Keep Volunteering Interfaith Partnership on helping people understand the SBA process.

AmeriCorps Team 1 (County):

The AmeriCorps Team placed a tarp on the roof of a home using materials and tools supplied by the Christian Aid Ministries. The Team piled and sorted debris on a three (3) acre property and prepared the property for removal of debris by means of heavy equipment. The Team coordinated with Christian Aid Ministries to move debris on site using heavy equipment and used chainsaws to cut a large number of fallen or hazardous trees on the property.

The AmeriCorps Team previewed a work site and communicated with land owner for future work the week of May 31, 2011.

AmeriCorps Team 2 (Walker County):

The AmeriCorps Team sorted and organized six (6) pallets of clothing at the Salvation Army warehouse in Jasper.

The Team sorted, organized and hung 30 large bags of clothing at VFW warehouse in Cordova.

The Team organized, sorted and repackaged for delivery 70 boxes of donated clothing at the Jaycee Fairgrounds and hung over 200 pieces of clothing in the warehouse.

VAL met with a staff member from St. Vincent of Paul, Angel Statemart of Catholic Charities and 32 families at the Holy Cross Catholic Church in Marshall County.

VAL conferred with Tuscaloosa County EMA Director to clarify the position regarding eligibility of the churches that responded to the disaster. VAL provided resources and services to survivors following the tornadoes.

VAL conferred with the American Red Cross (ARC) West Alabama Chapter representative regarding identifying key ARC and other contacts in Lamar, Fayette and Hale Counties for the Tuscaloosa/West Alabama Long Term Recovery Coalition.

VAL conferred with Field Operations Division C (South West) PA Specialist regarding the eligibility policy for reimbursement through PA for churches responding with resources and services to survivors following the disaster.

National Community Conservation Corps (NCCC) AmeriCorps Team 4:

The Team staffed the Tuscaloosa Volunteer Reception Center (VRC), trained approximately 18 local volunteers at various stations in VRC, processed 110 volunteers, deployed 47 volunteers to area projects, and completed 4 damage assessments.

18j. ESF-11 – Agriculture/Natural Resources: The number of poultry lost was 3,167,800, number of cattle was 92, and number of horses lost was 30. The carcasses were disposed of in accordance with Department of Agriculture guidelines with the assistance of the State Department of Forestry and other State agencies.

3. To support meeting the established Hazard Mitigation goals, obtain copies of the FEMA approved local Hazard Mitigation Plans (HMPs) in each of the affected jurisdictions.
4. Identify a solution to address the combined shelter needs of the City of Tuscaloosa, the Salvation Army, and current shelter occupants.
5. Complete public right-of-way debris removal by 15 August, 2011 in all 67 designated counties, continue DFA, Force Account, and contractor supported debris removal in all designated jurisdictions; finalize course of actions and work plan for wet debris removal in Lake Martin.
6. Engage severely impacted communities in the long term community recovery planning process. Continue phase two (2) of the community assessments, support the recovery planning process with internal & external partners in the affected communities.
7. Identify the highest densities of damage to housing structures (home, apartment buildings, etc.), the proximity of affected survivors to similar housing capabilities and courses of action to close any gaps.
8. Complete the provisioning & installation of all temporary critical public safety facilities using Direct Federal Assistance and/or Mutual Aid capabilities no later than Sunday June 5, 2011.
