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**5. Type of Incident:** The incident began on April 15, 2011, when severe storms, flooding, and tornadoes struck portions of Alabama. A second, more severe weather outbreak moved across the northern portion of Alabama during the early morning hours of April 27, 2011, with tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, hail and damaging straight line winds. Later that same day, numerous super-cell thunderstorms produces long-lived strong to violent tornadoes across the northern two-thirds of Alabama. The National Weather Services's (NWS's) official assessment has confirmed that 20 of the 62 tornadoes that struck the State of Alabama were rated EF1 to EF5 on the Fujita Scale.

**Current Situation:**

Registration for the FEMA Disaster Assistance and Small Business Administration Loans ended July 18, 2011.

FEMA Disaster Information Workshops opened in the following counties from July 14-18, 2011: Cullman, Jefferson, Marion, Tuscaloosa and Walker.

A total of \$65,658,905 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$65,387,057 has been disbursed. Seven hundred seventy-two (772) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$23,322,095.

Registration for funeral assistance is 352 as of COB July 20, 2011, and of that 162 requests approved, total \$1,096,572.

There are 17 inspectors in the field; as of July 20, 2011, 49,304 inspections have been issued with 49,102 returned for 99.6 percent completion.

A total of 7,934 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 368 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) were submitted to the State; 383 RPAs were logged into data entry and 383 were entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). Four hundred seventy-three (473) Project Worksheets (PWs) were received and entered into EMMIE and three hundred forty-seven (347) are obligated for \$48,946,031. Three hundred fifty-three (353) Kick-off Meetings are completed.

External Affairs (EA) has 70 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field; twenty-three (23) are bi-lingual (including English, Spanish, Creole, Vietnamese, Laotian and Sign language).

Fifty-nine (59) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) have been approved for United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance for Right of Way (ROW; an additional three (3) jurisdictions have enlisted for Private Property Debris Removal (PPDR). U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) completed its mission to remove wet debris from Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) on July 18, 2011.

**15. Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant:** Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Medical Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building, and the Cullman County Courthouse.

Multiple State Correctional Facilities received damage.

USACE has completed installation of 8 out of 8 damaged critical facilities in the following counties: Volunteer Fire Departments in Calhoun and Cullman counties, three (3) fire stations in Jefferson county and City Hall, Fire Department and Police Department in Marion County.
