Current Situation:

A total of \$52,969,541 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$52,791,471 has been dispersed. Five hundred and seventy-nine (579) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$17,487,142.

Counties with the most significant number of registrations are: Blount – 1,114, Calhoun – 1,419, Cullman – 5,567, DeKalb – 2,656, Jackson – 2,336, Jefferson – 12,632, Lawrence – 2,072, Limestone – 2,482, Madison – 16,667, Marshall – 4,564, Morgan – 2,281, St. Clair – 1,795, Tuscaloosa – 12,174, and Walker – 2,120.

Registration for funeral assistance is 326 as of COB June 10, 2011, and 111 requests have been approved for a total of \$725,791.

As of June 10, 2011, 21 Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) were operational with a total of 27,168 visitors.

As of June 10, 2011, all shelters closed.

A total of 7,227 rental units have been identified as available.

A total of 370 Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs) have been submitted to the State, 359 (RPAs) have been logged into data entry and 359 have been entered into Emergency Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE). Sixty-three (63) Project Worksheets (PWs) have been received and entered into EMMIE and twenty (20) have been obligated for \$3,022,225. Two hundred and twenty-two (222) Kick-off Meetings have been completed.

There are 26 Inspectors in the field. As of June 10, 2011, 44,403 inspections have been issued with 44,077 returned for 99 percent completion.

External Affairs (EA) has 220 Community Relations (CR) staff in the field; twenty-eight (28) are bi-lingual.

Fifty-six (56) jurisdictions and two (2) lakes, Lake Martin (Tallapoosa County) and Neely Henry Lake (St. Clair County) have been approved for United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) debris removal assistance. An estimated 3.9 million Cubic Yards (CYs)

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of debris to be removed by USACE Mission Assignment (MA); a total of 2,623,788 CYs has been removed.

Threats or Disruptions to Infrastructure, Significant: Damages to private and public schools consists of four (4) with major damage, two (2) in Cullman County and one (1) each in DeKalb and Franklin counties; seven (7) with major roof damage, one (1) in Jasper City (Marion County), and six (6) in St. Clair County; and three (3) destroyed in Tuscaloosa County.

Critical facilities destroyed are Fire Station #18 (Jefferson County) and Kowaliga Fire Station #2 (Elmore County). Major damage occurred to the Cullman Emergency Management Services (EMS) facility (Cullman County). Damaged and unusable facilities include the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Management building, Salvation Army building, and the Cullman County Courthouse.

17. Operations – Field Operations Branch (FOB):

The FOB Division Supervisors, Task Force Leaders (TFLDs), and Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) assigned to the divisions coordinated with key state, county, and local officials, held several meetings to address recovery activities currently underway and planned. Principal issues addressed involved public assistance (PA), temporary housing (TH), debris clearance, long-term community recovery (LTCR), mitigation, Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) closures, and shelters.

Housing Group:

Staff reviewed over 600 ineligible applicants in an effort to confirm their status and, or restart the process.

Staff reviewed all applicants in the Withdrawn (WVO) category to identify those desiring an initial inspection.

Staff reviewed 1,133 applicants in the 70-and-over age category for unmet needs.

Human Services Group Supervisor (HSGS):

FEMA program training was conducted for 15 attorneys from Legal Services of Alabama.

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Community Relations (CR):

Staff continued to implement the 'Neighborhood Partnership' initiative in ten (10) counties identified by Governor Bentley and to foster strong relationships by working together with local Faith-Based Organizations (FBO) to reach residents encouraging them to register. Staff continued to inform residents at the Sumter County Blitz in Geiger about the help center and assistance provided by FEMA. Staff attended the 9-1-1 Festival focused on honoring America's Emergency Responders to celebrate the First 9-1-1 call in Haleyville (Winston/Marion County) on April 16, 1968.

EA Congressional:

Congressional staff received six (6) inquiries; two (2) IA, two (2) PA, one (1) Mitigation and one (1) Community Relations. Staff began outreach to congressional offices providing information regarding the "Safer Alabama Summit". Staff continued to work with Program Liaisons to resolve seven (7) outstanding inquiries, specifically the Liberty Park debris removal issue, conducted outreach at nine (9) congressional district offices to encourage attendance to the "Safer Alabama Summit" on June 13. Staff provided updated disaster-related information on the FEMA local hire program. Staff disseminated updated disaster-related information about Disaster Recovery Centers, applicant documentation and eligibility letters.

Inter-Governmental Affairs (IGA):

IGA staff visited the Elgin Fire Chief (Lauderdale County) to review damage and recovery needs as a result of May storms. Staff followed up with the mayor of Hodges (Franklin County) to assess current needs. Staff attended Kick-off Meeting in Clay County and met with local officials. Staff met with the mayor of Brilliant (Marion County) to assess damage and recovery needs in unincorporated areas. Staff met with the Chilton County Commissioner and mayor of Natural Bridge (Walker County) for IGA staff introductions and assess current needs, issues and priorities. Staff finalized FEMA participation at the June 11 Storm Expo sponsored by the Pleasant Grove (Jefferson County) Mayor. IGA staff visited the Marshall County Administrator to review progress and to assess current needs, issues and priorities. Staff visited the mayor of Sipsey (Walker County) to follow up, review clean up and other recovery progress.

Joint Information Center (JIC):

Staff edited five to six video projects for the June 13, 2011, Safer Alabama Summit. Staff conducted 61 total media visits with television, print and radio regarding, debris removal, registration deadline, crisis counseling, unemployment insurance, recovery updates, mitigation, determination letters, SBA loans, flood insurance, safe rooms, 'Right of Entry' forms and long term recovery. Information also was given on the Tuscaloosa DAWG HAUS. Eleven contacts were made with Hispanic media organizations.

Staff produced three (3) news releases, "Tornado debris removal tops 4.3 million cubic yards", "FEMA hiring local workers for disaster recovery" and "Include Mitigation money in your SBA home repair disaster loan". Staff worked on material for the Safer Alabama Summit and produced public service announcements on "FEMA rebuilding specialists now available for free advice".
