Alabama county coroners confirmed one (1) additional storm related fatalities for a total of 241 fatalities.

A total of \$50,623,252 has been approved for Individuals and Households Program (IHP) and \$50,010,360 has been dispersed. Five hundred and twenty-seven (527) IHP Max Awards have been approved for a total of \$15,916,742.

A private citizen, after disregarding direction to vacate operational debris removal and reduction area in DeKalb County, was struck by debris and taken to the hospital for treatment. Contractor leadership initiated an All-Hands Statewide Safety Stand-down halting work for 1 hour June 4, 2011, to conduct safety briefings and reiterate procedures to follow to alleviate future occurrences.

Moving stumps greater than 24" began June 4, 2011.

Staff received a total of 13,267 cases; 10,785 have been reviewed, 2,482 cases pending with 81 percent completed.

IA Branch Director:

Deputy IA Branch Director:

IA Branch Deputy Director met with Volunteer Agency Liaison (VAL) to discuss operation strategy. Staff met with Alabama Emergency Management Agency (AEMA), Small Business Administration (SBA) and Mission Birmingham to discuss Pratt City (Jefferson County) concerns.

Two (2) IA Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) provided program support for Shoal Creek (St. Clair County), two (2) staff provided program support for the Anderson Hills Community Town Hall Meeting (Madison County) and two (2) staff provided program support for the Mayor of Hamilton at the City Council Meeting (Marion County). Five (5) SMEs staff provided program information to Bethel Missionary Baptist Congress of Christian Educators in North Birmingham (Jefferson County).

Human Services Group Supervisor (HSGS):

HS Group Supervisor analyzed daily reports for program compliance and ensured proper funding is in place for all IA programs. Staff conducted a conference call with a representative for the Young Lawyers Division, American Bar Association (ABA) to obtain an update on the activities of the Young Lawyers providing services for this disaster.

Other Needs Assistance (ONA):

ONA staff processed 39 pending funeral assistance cases, 14 have been paid. Currently, they have received 259 registrations of which 96, (55) percent are eligible and have been paid. There are 85 cases pending eligibility determination.

Nine (9) cases authorizing payment of eligible funeral expenses were received and sent for payment, these cases represent 12 fatalities.

The total cases to date approved and in process for payment for funeral assistance is 112, representing 150 fatalities. A balance of 90 fatalities (37) percent remains from the 241 confirmed by the State.

Special Needs:

Staff received 10 new special needs referrals, a total of 121 have been received; four (4) cases are pending process and 117 completed.

Crisis Counseling-Immediate Services Program: (CC-ISP)

Staff confirmed with Alabama State Department of Mental Health the toll free telephone number for "Project Rebound". Staff provided information to the State to assist in their compliance with condition of the CC-ISP grant.

Disaster Housing Operations (DHOPS):

Staff assisted USACE to monitor setups in progress on private sites in Marion, Franklin, Lawrence, Madison, Limestone, Winston, Tuscaloosa, Walker, Cullman, Blount, Morgan, St. Clair, Etowah, Cherokee and Calhoun Counties.

Staff monitored setups on commercial sites in Marengo, Choctaw, Sumter, Hale, Washington, DeKalb, Marshall and Jackson Counties.

Part of the team conducted assessments on sites already entered in the database located in Jefferson County. The crew took pictures and gathered information on required tools and potential hazards. Corps members spread the word regarding the Alabama Recovery Coordination Center through flyers and word of mouth.

Tuscaloosa County:

VAL staff assisted on June 6, 2011, with American Red Cross (ARC) West Alabama Chapter Executive Director, and United Way of West Alabama staff regarding clarification of Tuscaloosa and West Alabama Long Term Recovery Coalition Steering Committee list and the addition of new "members" to the LTRC in preparation for the next LTRC meeting.

VAL staff met with the LTRC Steering Committee at United Way of West Alabama in Tuscaloosa.

VAL met on June 6, 2011, in Tuscaloosa with the Manager of DRC 26, who provided information regarding a local church, Baily Tabernacle, which might be willing to assist with providing shelter to those affected by the closing of the ARC shelter in Tuscaloosa.

VAL attended the Mayor's daily 8:15am debriefing meetings at Tuscaloosa City Hall.

Hale, Perry, Marengo, Sumter, Greene, and Choctaw:

VAL contacted Hero Housing's representative to discuss the group's rebuilding activities in the above counties and explain the evolving LTRC which would include these counties.

VAL attended LTRC first meeting held in Cullman County. All Organizations present committed to support the LTRC and meet on a weekly basis. Meeting was held at Mayor's office in Cullman City Hall, Northeast Cullman.

Franklin, Marion and Limestone Counties:

VAL coordinated with the First Baptist Church in Phil Campbell (Franklin County) and the Limestone County LTRC for pickup and delivery of a pallet of personal hygiene items for the Phil Campbell warehouse in Phil Campbell. The Hackleburg (Marion County) warehouse was also advised to pickup two (2) pallets requested by them.

Limestone County:

VAL met with VOAD to work on establishing a Limestone County LTRC at the United Way in Athens.

Lawrence County:

VAL traveled to Moulton for a meeting scheduled with the EMA Director and the Chamber of Commerce Representative to establish initial contacts for a LTRC. Representatives from FEMA were present. The EMA Director stated that a LTRC was in initial process of being established and provided the key contacts. VAL explained the LTRC process and the importance of including national and local resources in a collaborative effort to fully recover. Meeting was held in Moulton.

VAL initiated contacts with VOAD Chairman and the EMA to coordinate dates for the establishment of an LTRC meeting.

Marion County:

VAL coordinated with United Way representative at FEMA's request to have supplies and food for volunteers in Hackleburg. VAL explained the process and met at the Volunteer Center, Hackleburg, to further assist needs.

AmeriCorps Washington Conservation Corps Team (10 member)

Worked the volunteer coordination at the VOAD in Hackleburg; team is in charge of volunteer coordination with VOAD.

Received 45 volunteers and coordinated work for them at the VOAD and in the field; team is in charge of assessing and re-assessing the work orders submitted to VOAD.

Marion County has been divided into four quadrants and located all work orders properties on the map. We are systematically determining work to be done and efficiently managing the labor needed.

Assessed 30 properties (most of which had already been completed or out of the skill set of volunteers and AmeriCorps team as well) and are coordinating heavy equipment for debris removal.

Worked on property in Shottsville, moving debris to the right of way for removal and cutting downed hazardous trees for removal and preparing the property for heavy equipment debris removal.

Walker County:

VAL representatives represented FEMA at the Walker County Long Term Recovery Committee (LTRC) meeting in Jasper.

The name of the committee was formalized as "The Walker County Long Term Recovery Committee"

Both a mission statement and by-laws were adopted.
